<p>This course aims to provide students with basic knowledge required to analyse current political events in Lithuania, introduce students to the most important features of modern Lithuanian society in a broad cultural, historic and modern context, as well as to broaden the knowledge of Lithuanian state and society. Course will develop student analytical and problem-solving competencies by providing them with real-world scenarios related to Lithuanian politics, and will encourage them to creatively address issues that modern-day Lithuania is facing by working both individually and as part of a group.</p>

Assessment strategy	Weight %	Deadline	Assessment criteria
Active participation in seminars and lectures	40	During the semester	The students are expected to actively participate in lectures and seminars, study compulsory lecture and seminar material, and demonstrate their ability to discuss topics related to Lithuanian social and political life, using the material provided. Evaluation criteria: 1) Preparedness: students will need to demonstrate their ability (orally or in writing) to discuss and critically evaluate the material provided. 2) Active participation: students are expected to participate in group tasks and actively discuss seminar and lecture material
Group assignments	20	Week 3 and Week 9	The students will have to carry out two group assignments. The assignments will require the students to creatively approach problem questions related to Lithuanian social and political life. The students will be evaluated based on the quality of the content, creativity and the ability to work as a group.
Written assignment	40	Week 12	The students will have to write an academic essay on the topic of their choosing. The topics will need to be discussed and confirmed with the lecturer by Week 9. The essay will be evaluated on the quality of the content, ability to adhere to academic requirements, structure and overall brilliance.
